Hi Friends -

There has been a lot of loose talk lately about invoking the 25th Amendment to the Constitution — specifically Section 4 — as the way to remove Donald Trump from office. **But people who advocate this have** no clue why the amendment was enacted in 1967 or what it is for.


On July 2, 1881, Presdient James A. Garfield was shot by an insane

assassin. He lingered for over two months and finally died on September 19. In October 1919 President Woodrow Wilson suffered a severe stroke. For the rest of his term he was significantly debilitated. So who was running their administrations and the nation while these chief executives were alive, yet incapacitated? The vice president, members of the cabinet, the first lady? The Constitution originally made no provision for such periods of extended **presidential disability**. That is the reason, and the *only* reason, for Section 4 of the 25th Amendment. Despite his hoggish diet, Trump is not (yet) physically disabled. And yes,

he's ignorant, erratic, and infantile, but none of those are necessarily indications of an actual metal illness. Plus who in the administration is qualified to judge whether Trump truly is mentally "unable to discharge the powers and duties of his office?" That is the province of a clinical psychologist or psychiatrist, and the vice president is neither of those, not is any member of the cabinet, (HUD Secretary Ben Carson comes the closest, but do you really want him making a decision like this?) No, the 25th Amendment was not enacted to get rid of a president who

is incompetent, a liar, or a jerk — or in the case of Donald Trump, all three. So knock off all this nonsense about using the 25th Amendment to separate Trump from the presidency. It's uninformed and it's pointless. Impeachment and conviction is the only route — and even that is a long shot.

wonderfully eclectic release that ranges from bebop to bossa nova, from Jerome Kern to Sting, from Benny Carter to Bono. more than blend, they feed and nourish each other. In this live program of originals, standards, and what seems to have become Cohen's signature song, Jimmy Rowles' "The Peacocks," these remarkable artists listen as much as they play, interact as much as they instigate. Mike DiRubbo: Live at Smalls (SmallsLIVE): Some music — perhaps most music — is best heard live, driven by the immediacy of "being there," free, from the influence of edits, effects, and extraneous post-

production. Alto saxophonist Mike DiRubbo and his quartet — pianist Brian Charette, bassist Ugonna Okegwo, drummer Jongkuk Kim — capture that experience here, ably stretching out on seven of Dirubbo's originals. 
