NEW & RECOMMENDED CDS

<u>Carl Bartlett, Jr.</u>: *Promise!* (self-released): Alto saxophonist Carl Bartlett, Jr.'s aptly named second release fulfills the promise of his 2011 debut, *Hopeful*. Backed by a solid rhythm section — pianist Yoichi Uzecki, bassist Marcus McLaurine, drummer Sylvia Cuenca — through eight original compositions, and joined on two of them by his uncle, Charles Bartlett, on trumpet, his bright tone and resourceful imagination combine to spin some engaging musical tales.

<u>Michael Dease</u>: *Reaching Out* (<u>Posi-Tone</u>): As much as any player of his generation, Michael Dease is defining the current state of the jazz trombone. His latest contribution is a typically well programmed, impeccably rendered, hard bop driven outing laced with four of his originals, hat tips to trombone masters Conrad Herwig and Steve Turre, a few clever interpretations of pop hits by Paul McCartney, Babyface, and Extreme, and more.

Ryan Keberle & Catharsis: Find the Common Shine a Light (Greenleaf Music): In this time of great turmoil, trombonist-keyboardist Ryan Keberle and his cutting-edge ensemble, Catharsis, has issued this "urgent call for change." The luminous voice of Camila Meza reinforces the project's social message, and two selections in particular — Bob Dylan's "The Times They Are A-Changin'" and the Beatles' "Fool on the Hill" — recall a time when progressive politics and music weren't strangers. Here and now, Ryan Keberle and Catharsis are working to reunite them.

Jovino Santos Neto & André Mehmari: Guris (Adventure Music): Brazilian pianists Jovino Santos Neto and André Mehmari have created an affectionate, intelligent dedication to their countryman, the prolific composer and one-of-a-kind multi-instrumentalist Hermeto Pascoal. They celebrate Pascoal's genius with his works plus their own Pascoal-inspired pieces. And as a wonderful bonus, the master appears on three tracks, playing melodica on one and tea kettle — yes, *tea kettle* — on two.


