In past few months we have witnessed in this sick, sad nation the rise of a more active, more emboldened, more dangerous fascist current, a can of mixed nuts salted with neo-Nazis, white supremacists, citizens' militias, and those nasty little pseudo-intellectuals who call themselves the "alt-right." And it's been working. In the weeks since Charlottesville — where, let's

were afraid of being outnumbered by masses of decent folks and of getting their butts kicked by the fearsome antifa. Good! Let them be afraid to spew their toxic filth anywhere in the land of We the People. So don't denounce the antifa. They get it, even if you don't. "We aren't glitter bombing Nazis," they've declared. "We aren't throwing flour on them. We definitely aren't going to peacefully shut them down. They want to kill us, they said so in Charlottesville. ... Their violence needs to be met with great force." Look, if you can't or won't join them in the

And one thing: if you're not going to confront the fascists, stay safely out of the way. Your pacifism can be a liability. You and others may get hurt. Have you forgotten, Americans? The Abraham Lincoln Brigade was antifa. The French Resistance, the Dutch Resistance, your fathers and grandfathers — that so-called "greatest generation" — were antifa. I am


antifa. Are you? And if you aren't, then what the hell are you?


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
