No other developed nation comes close to the rate of gun violence in America. Americans own an estimated 265 million guns, more than one gun for every adult. —The Guardian, October 2, 2017

Hi Friends -

Only in recent years has the Supreme Court endorsed the (mistaken) notion that the framers of the Constitution wrote the Second Amendment to protect a private right of armed self-defense. In United States v. Cruikshank (1876) the Court ruled, "The right to bear arms is not granted by the Constitution; neither is it in any manner dependent upon that instrument for its existence." In United States v. Miller (1939) it ruled that the federal government and the states could limit any weaponry not having a "reasonable relationship to the preservation or efficiency of a well-regulated militia."

Article 1, Section 8 of the Constitution expressly states that the role of a militia is to "execute the Laws of the Union, suppress Insurrections" – including, in those days, suppressing the Natives and capturing runaway slaves - "and repel Invasions." At that time the US did not have a federal standing army, so state militias were necessary for these purposes. They no longer are. And "personal self-defense" never was part of the equation.

I am not just "pro-gun control," I am anti-gun. Short of amending the Constitution to repeal the Second Amendment, or getting a majority onto the Supreme Court who understand the original intent and actual purpose of the amendment, at the very least we need to: 1. Reinstate and strengthen the assault weapons ban that Congress so cowardly rescinded in 2005 (Well over half of all mass killings in US history have occurred since the ban expired.); 2. Limit high-capacity magazines (which alone won't stop mass shootings, but at least would limit the number of victims); 3. Ban the manufacture, sale, and possession of bump stocks and silencers; 4. Prohibit all non-store sales of weapons (through gun shows, classified ads, personal contacts); 5. Make gun licenses subject to expiration and renewal; 6. Require gun owners to purchase liability insurance. (Add background checks if you like, but I think they'd be minimally effective, at most.)

And while you're at it, politicians, screw your worthless "thoughts and prayers." Stop thinking. Stop praying. And start doing.
